The Young Endeavour Program

The Australian National Sail Training Ship Young Endeavour

- A gift from the United Kingdom for the 1988 Bicentenary
- Operated and maintained by the Royal Australian Navy
- Generates revenue for Navy to offset the cost of operations
- Supported by a team of Navy members, civilians and contractors
- Youth development voyages for Australian citizens aged 16-23
- · Sails the Australian coast, the region, and around the world
- Part of Navy's Community Engagement Strategy



Royal Australian Navy Commitment to Community Engagement

Navy Community Engagement is designed to:

- Improve community knowledge and understanding
- · Provide opportunities to meet Navy personnel
- Inform people about work and life in the Navy
- Promote rewarding, challenging career options







Royal Australian Navy Commitment to Community Engagement

Young Endeavour does this each year by:

- Undertaking more than 20 voyages (220+ days at sea)
- Embarking 500+ youth crew and thousands of guests
- Visiting and promoting Navy in 50+ ports around the country
- Participating in significant events and regattas
- Open ships, community day sails, receptions and other events
- Hosting media and community leaders




Our Mission

"To provide young Australians with a unique, challenging and inspirational experience at sea, which increases their self awareness, develops their teamwork and leadership skills, and creates a strong sense of community responsibility".

The Ship

A 44 metre brigantine, purpose built for sail training

- Equipped with modern technology and world standard safety and navigation equipment
- Maintained to Lloyd's 100A1 LMC Yacht Class AND Navy standards
- Staffed by the Royal Australian Navy
- · Sails approximately 10,000 nautical miles each year



The Youth Crew

24 youth crew (trainees) embark for each voyage



- 16-23 years of age, from across Australia
- Australian citizens or permanent residents



- Able to swim 50 metres, weigh less than 120kg and be in good health
- Pay for the voyage and youth development program (US\$1,500)



Often include Australian
 Defence Force cadets and junior officers

The Program

Youth development delivered at sea in a context of sail training

Phase 1: Crisis Phase

- 3-4 days, includes challenges such as seasickness, lack of sleep, unfamiliar people and environment
- -Development of essential skills, self awareness, ability to persevere

Phase 2: Transition Phase

- -4-5 days, youth crew move from instructor-led to self-led activities
- -Youth crew take on leadership roles within each watch

Phase 3: Arrival Phase

- -2-3 days, culminating in the conclusion of the voyage
- -Youth crew are given Command of Young Endeavour for 24 hours
- Consolidation of sailing skills and soft skills



Adventure Training at Sea

Sail Training - The Tall Ship Environment

- · A unique and powerful opportunity for education
- · The unfamiliar environment creates opportunities for growth
- Participants are compelled to adapt to their new circumstances
- Participants learn to work with a diverse range of people, adapt to living and working in a new environment, and overcome challenges

- · Social capital is built by increasing trust, cooperation and tolerance
- Experiences translate into enduring social skills that are readily transferrable to every day life and career settings

STAFF CREW

Young Endeavour Staff Crew are specially selected

- 15 permanent Navy personnel plus a pool of 20 Navy Reservists
- · Nine Staff Crew to deliver each voyage, three bunks for training
- Crew are posted to the ship for two years
- Provide a Naval structure and context to the program

World Voyage 2015

In 2015 Young Endeavour undertook a twelve month circumnavigation of the world.

- Comprised eight discrete passages
- 202 young Australians and 6 New Zealanders joined 30 Navy crew, spending up to 60 days at sea
- 24 trainees in Young Endeavour the Tall Ship Race
 Kristiansand to Aalborg the first Australian tall ship to participate
- 72 youth on three passages crossed the Atlantic Ocean
- 48 youth were on board to mark the 100th anniversary of the Anzac landings at the Gallipoli Peninsula
- The voyage include the ship's first visit to Europe since 1992

The Future Young Endeavour Program

Commercial Operations

- A commitment to offsetting the cost of operation (50%).
- Voyage fees, sponsorship, community and corporate partnerships

STS Young Endeavour has been in operation for 31 years

- The life of the ship has been extended to 2023-24
- · Maintenance costs continue to increase, while availability declines
- The current configuration (24 trainees) not commercially viable

Acquisition of a new ship is scheduled 2021-24

- Proposed configuration: Barquentine, FPS 50m, <500 dwt
- Proposed capacity >40 youth crew, 12 staff crew



Maximising Return on Investment

- Deliver the Young Endeavour Youth Development Program to a greater number of diverse young Australians, well into the future
- Operate a platform and program with the highest safety standards
- Classification Society, Navy Technical Regulations,
- · Australian Maritime Safety Authority
- Maintain a pricing structure that is accessible to a diverse range of young Australians, while offsetting the cost of operation
- Move towards a self sustaining model of operation

- Maintain the highest standards of professional and personal development for Navy crew posted to the ship
- Provide opportunities for junior Navy and Defence personnel to participate in the youth development program
